Former U.S. Representative (R-SC) Bob Inglis says Biden's new climate executive orders treat climate change as the urgent issue, but there's a big problem — these orders risk being more ephemeral than enduring solutions. What's established by an executive order in one administration can be wiped away by the next one.

- The only durable action to lower emissions is passing bold, bipartisan legislation. Congress must be involved.
- The State Department being asked to send the Montreal Protocol's Kigali Amendment to the Senate is a step in the right direction. The Kigali Amendment aims at drastically cutting hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs), a very potent greenhouse gas that warms the planet.
- But the best solution, instead of more temporary executive orders, is to embrace what's fundamentally a conservative solution: pricing carbon. If we implemented a border-adjustable carbon tax, we would create incentives to lower emissions, unleash American innovation, and avoid harming the economy in the process unlike executive branch regulations that duck Congress.
- There's bipartisan support on Capitol Hill for this approach, and bipartisan legislative solutions are the only ones that will work on climate in the long term.
